Watch the film *The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* (on haiku) and answer the following questions:

- 1. Describe how mise-en-scene and editing are used in this film to create **mood**.
- Describe how mise-en-scene and editing are used to create relationships and/or character.

For each question, choose **at least three** of the following elements to discuss: sequencing, transitions, pace, lighting, set, costumes/props, proxemics, sound (diegetic or non-diegetic).

Be specific! WHICH technique/s are used and HOW do they create mood/character?
